A Note from the Chair

The highlight of the year was without a doubt our IYN assessment when we received the top award for a second year 'OUTSTANDING' with a 95% mark. Our assessor said: 'They are what a good allotment association should be, full of enthusiasm and ideas and encouraging everyone to develop'.

Keep Scotland Beautiful invited us to give a talk at their annual seminar and IYN Awards Ceremony in Stirling. This was a particular compliment as it was the 50th anniversary of Britain in Bloom. Huge thanks go to Wendy who prepared and delivered a talk on 'Growing a Community' to 170 people – she hasn't recovered yet!

Other successes this year include the annual BBQ & competitions, school open day, photographic competition and resulting calendar. Just recently we had a very successful quiz night where we welcomed many visitors and raised nearly £600 for community projects. TAMS, the Allotment Market Stall, was again hugely popular and thanks go to all who contributed, with Greg and Liz helping to organise collection and sales of produce at the stall.



In addition we have our very own prize winners at Slopefield. As well as winning many prizes for his amazing flowers at national shows, Terry has also been honoured by the Royal Horticultural Society with the highest possible accolade – a lifetime achievement award (The RHS Scotland Certificate of Merit). This award is only given in exceptional circumstances and is earned for achievements made over a long period, so very well done Terry. And Johan, with her beautiful floral art, has won prizes at RHS shows in Aberdeen and Banchory.

Our ongoing partnership with Airyhall Primary School, whose pupils visit once a week, continues to thrive. Thanks to Jane, Terry, the three Liz's, two Gordon's and various others who all pass on their gardening skills to the next generation. In addition, our important partnership with the James Hutton Institute continues, and look out for their activities as part of the 2015 International Year of Soil.

The IYN seminar is always an inspirational and enjoyable day, and gives a unique opportunity for community groups from around Scotland to come together to celebrate their achievements, share ideas, make friends, and find out about the work of other groups. Catherine and I went to the annual Seminar and Awards Ceremony in the Albert Hall in Stirling in October to receive the certificate on behalf of the Association.

This year, however, not only were we receiving an award, but we had also been asked to talk about our own experiences. When we went to the seminar in 2012 (our first year in IYN), I would not have believed for a minute that only two years later we would be asked to share our story! However, I found myself up on the stage, giving a presentation called: 'Growing a Community', proudly outlining what we have developed at Slopefield over the past few years. Only two or three other IYN groups had been asked to present this year, and as 122 community groups had participated, it was a real compliment for Slopefield to be asked.

Leaf Mould, Wood Chippings and Compost

Please help yourself to wood chipping and leaf mould from the bays and the pile nearest to the entrance to the site. This coming spring the James Hutton Institute is supplying Slopefield with the contents of its compost bays (leaves, grass cuttings, woody debris, etc. from its grounds). The Hutton Institute have kindly organised to transport it to our site. Please note this material has not been sorted and must be used and accepted as seen. Watch out for notices about its delivery.

Our annual BBQ was held on 14 September, and was a wonderful occasion which brought together over 50 people including plotters, their families and our special guests to share delicious food, homemade salads and cakes. Our Year of Biodiversity

As highlighted elsewhere we have been building up our efforts to enhance biodiversity at Slopefield. Over the years this has included the planting of wild fruit trees and bushes, our bug hotel and wildflower verges. Most recently we have been building bat and bird boxes, established a community pond and filmed the variety of biodiversity at Slopefield to the delight of the children. This year we aim to focus on increasing our collective awareness and improving our site and this is a specific area for development in our IYN assessment. In particular, we will:

- plant our 105 native fruit trees received from the Woodland Trust on our Community Day on 29 March;
- hold additional Community Days where we aim to build bat and bird boxes, and hold talks on biodiversity, in collaboration with Rose Toney our local Biodiversity Co-ordinator (rose.toney@hutton.ac.uk);
- take part in the RSPB Birdwatch and record all the birds which visit Slopefield;
- prepare species sheets for bees and butterflies to record what's on your plot;
- advise on suitable 'Apps' for species recording through Citizen Science.

Site Security

The gate locking system has been running for a year and while most plot holders have been locking the gate on entering and leaving there is still a minority who have been either leaving the gate unlocked or even open. Aberdeen City Council recently wrote to plot holders reminding everyone that they require the gate to be locked at all times and advising on the dangers of not having a secure site.

Security

It is sad to report that the lock and gate were vandalised but now the locking system has been repaired and functioning again. The lock was modified to make the padlock access easier to access from both sides but we have frequently noticed that it has been locked in an 'upside-down' position which makes it difficult to access from the inside. Please be aware of this and try to leave the padlock in a downward position – many thanks.

Petty crime is also a concern to the Committee and if you have any issues please contact your row representative – details of which can be found on the community plot noticeboard.

The Allotment Market Stall (TAMS)

The Allotment Market Stall is set up in Duthie Park on Fridays and Saturdays during the summer and autumn season to sell excess produce from around 8 allotment sites in Aberdeen. TAMS seeks to cut waste from allotment sites, offer volunteering opportunities, provide healthy, locally-grown produce to the community and donates any surplus produce to the food bank network.

TAMS operates in conjunction with CFINE – Common Food Initiative in the North East and the Community Payback team. Some of the money raised from the stall comes back to the participating allotments and Slopefield's money will be used to support community projects on the site. This year the TAMS project was Runner-Up in the Eco Award for new community projects in Aberdeen.

Surplus produce is always welcome and is usually collected from the box on site on Thursdays so please help support this if you can. Help with collection can be arranged. Volunteers are always welcome to man the stall.

Recipe

Ingredients & method:

250g porridge oats	handful pumpkin seeds	75g light muscavado
150g butter	handful chopped apricots	sugar
75g golden syrup	handful sunflower seeds	grated ginger

Melt the butter, syrup and sugar in a saucepan. Take off the heat and then mix in the oats, the seeds, apricots and ginger. Bake at 175°C (gas mark 4) for 20 mins or until golden. Makes one swiss roll tin's worth.
